It seems appropriate, in this monthly column, to share with you, especially newer members, some of the highlights of this treasure trove of information as we celebrate our 33rd year. Here is a glimpse into what our Club members have accomplished, and the dedicated women who have helped us grow and evolve... 30+ years later. **This month we focus on 2014 – 2015.**

From the Desk of the Archivist...

Judy Gay began a second term as President, with Ruth Henderson as VP for a second term. Judy's focus for the year was to remind us all that one of the main purposes of CFUW "is to lobby the Federal Government to initiate programs and improve services for the benefit of women and girls". She worked diligently to ensure that the National Resolutions were distributed locally to MP's and MPP's, and the Medical Officer of Health. She also wrote letters to local politicians to discuss the Federal 2015 Budget. Judy was dedicated to the ideals and mandate of CFUW and we appreciated all her efforts.

Judy Thomson, Membership chair reported that we had 51 members. Among 3 others, Ellen Shearer joined the Club. Judy Thomson once again hosted the New Members Coffee Party.

Sydney Misener chaired the Program Committee. Our programs were primarily held at St Andrews Church Hall, although our September Wine and Cheese meet and greet was held at the lovely Butchart Estate hosted by our member, Kimberly Love.

In October, to recognize Domestic Violence Awareness month, we viewed a compelling TED talk video, and listened to a presentation by Patty Kelly, Executive Director of the Women's Centre.

The November meeting was a special 100-year anniversary and remembrance of the victims of WW1. The Book Club presented a few of the books they had selected for further study of the War.

December is a month when we recognize others in our community who are not as fortunate as we are. Many families depend on the support of food banks and meal programs. Jill Umbach spoke about the work and efforts of the local Poverty Task Force.

A highlight of the year was the return of Professor Ken Weber. He spoke to a full house on *The Other Mothers of Invention*, debunking a number of commonly held myths about who or why certain items were discovered and subsequently patented for use.

Our Scholarship Program was once again able to give three \$1,000 Scholarships to deserving young women in our area, thanks to the generosity of our members.

The Issues Group discussed a variety of topics such as Voting Trends, Family Farms, Child Care and Prominent Canadian Women.

This year was the first year for Art Explorers Group headed by Judy Thomson. Its purpose was and still is, to enlighten members about art, artists and the art world. They twice visited the TOM, and also a number of other private local galleries. 10 enthusiastic members joined this interest Group.

The Gardeners Group was also very active and engaged in visiting local nurseries. They also spent time and effort researching History of Plant Classification and Potential Invasive Plants.

Healthy Lifestyles Coordinator, Loreen Cumming, lead the group on a variety of hikes, walks and snowshoeing adventures. They also visited two farm markets. As well, they had speakers present information about the Safe and Sound Organization and the Alzheimer's Society of Grey Bruce.

Another Interest Group emerged from the desire of some members to have some fun and play games... hence the new Games Group. Our members were playing various games at the homes of volunteer hosts and having a lot of laughs and great snacks!

The Website was up and running thanks to Janine Sobiski who helped us all be connected, by ensuring that the website included Newsletters, Membership Lists, a calendar and photos.

ART EXPLORERS, continued ...

Wednesday November 8 at 10:00 AM

The Roly Fenwick *Lifelines in Light* exhibition at the Tom Thomson Art Gallery finishes at the end of the month. This will be an interesting private tour and discussion of a legendary artist who has roots in Owen Sound. He is ninety-one and still paints so it will be inspiring to us all.

Heather McLeese is back at the gallery after parental leave and has taken on the role of organizing tours from Shannon Bingeman and she is offering private group tours on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings. So even though this conflicts with the Healthy Lifestyle walking group I've decided to have our TOM tour on **Wednesday November 8 at 10:00.** If you've seen the current exhibitions already, getting more information from Heather will enlighten and inspire you even more. There is now a \$5.00 plus HST = \$5.65 total tour charge, even if you have an Open card. I'll add Heather's explanation below*

The exhibition in the South gallery is *(Re)Inventing Wilderness* with the work of contemporary artists Gary Blundell and Victoria Ward who have revisited an area where evidence of the destruction of the logging industry has inspired their work. This addresses the subject of how humans have exploited our wilderness areas and still do so is very relevant with our concerns about climate change.

"In the early 2000s they moved from an urban area to a remote cabin near Gooderham, Ontario, not far from Algonquin Park. In their immediate environment they found themselves surrounded by traces of the same late 19th and early 20th century industry that Thomson would have been witness to, including a de-commissioned beehive sawdust burner that was used to incinerate sawdust - a vestigial of that area's former logging industry. Both artists have returned to the burner site frequently over the years, depicting it in varying iterations, and in the process, steadily witnessing its gradual deterioration."

Both exhibitions are worth seeing and we have this opportunity to hear more about them. You will enjoy the newly renovated entrance to the TOM but be aware that the new elevator is not functioning yet. Please let me know if you can come so that I can advise Heather of the numbers.

* from Heather: "I've spent the past two months - since my return to work from my parental leave - restructuring and redeveloping our new guided tour and school program offerings. With the shift to an OPEN membership, which is a great opportunity for the Gallery to connect with more members in our community, it has changed how we look at our educational program offerings and fees attached to our guided tours. We have structured our new guided school and group tour offerings to a set price per person – adult pricing at \$5.00 plus HST = \$5.65 total, per participant. This is the same pricing we're charging for students/per participant for tours as well. I do understand that a lot of your Art Explorers group are existing OPEN members and some a part of our Supporters Circle Program, and we appreciate this support as well. So, the simple answer to your question is, yes, the fee still does apply to those individuals who have an OPEN membership...."

Cynthia Porter and Judy Armstrong travelled to Port Elgin on the evening of October 19th to hear the indigenous writer/broadcaster **Jesse Wente** speak to an audience of at least 400 attendees. Here are Cynthia's musings ...

"It was a wonderful opportunity to go with Judy to hear lesse."

"It was a wonderful opportunity to go with Judy to hear Jesse Wente speak. What impressed me the most was his relaxed, engaging and often humorous presentation. Despite the painfully slow progress Jesse sees evidence, since The Truth and

Reconciliation Commission, of a shift in understanding and willingness to resolve the indigenous rights issue and move forward. He said that the truth has been told and accepted but reconciliation is yet to be completed. His talk focused on completing the reconciliation process in Canada today, and his approach to this emphasized the way these issues are presented and understood and how we choose to move forward. Much of what he said about this is in his recent book "Unreconciled: Family, Truth, and Indigenous Resistance" which he read passages from. He sees healing most clearly in Indigenous youth today who are educated, progressive, and have the ability to complete the reconciliation process and move forward. We were left with a lot of information to process but a better understanding of the subject and our role in it. It was a great evening, even if we couldn't find Judy's car in the dark after the event!" ~ Cynthia Porter

OPPORTUNITIES FOR COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT


