Our Club was founded in 1990, spearheaded by two very dynamic women, Alma Wilson and Norah Egener. Our charter was awarded in August 1991 at the National annual general meeting in Toronto. We were the 135th club in Canada at that time.

We look forward to celebrating our 35th Anniversary, beginning September 2025.

ADVOCACY

In the May issue of this newsletter, we provided the full and final resolution that we submitted to CFUW Ontario Council at its recent AGM. Our resolution, entitled *Ontario Seniors' Advocate*, was presented by Angela Yenssen who was the driving force behind the crafting and writing of our resolution. Her presentation is provided, below. We are grateful to Angela for her expertise and guidance. It's important to note that our resolution was one of only two resolutions passed at Ontario Council's May 24th AGM.

Angela Yenssen's remarks to CFUW Ontario Council AGM, May 24 2025:

<u>Introduction:</u> I am going to focus these two minutes on explaining the thought process behind our club's Advocacy Committee submitting this resolution.

We identified that we wanted to do some sort of project related to aging in place._Aging in place is certainly what all of us want, and national polling data indicate that many Canadians agree with us. After the CFUW national resolution about aging in place was approved, we sharpened our focus on discussing what action we could take to support implementation of the broad principles in the national resolution through specific actions at the provincial level.

We quickly became overwhelmed by the many different specific actions that could be taken to promote aging in place. For example, building code requirements influence the accessibility of new homes constructed. Legal eligibility requirements for publicly funded home care services impact the availability of home care services.

As we considered all of the possibilities, we realized that we should not be deciding which actions are the top priorities to facilitate aging in place. What we really need in this province is a person who is independent of government who is able to gather data about what is working and what is not working in the aging experience and can prepare recommendations based on the data to support aging in place and other aspects of quality of life in the aging experience. We created the seniors' advocate resolution before you to implement this vision.

<u>Conclusion</u>: Thank you to all of the clubs who took an interest in this resolution and sent us feedback. We implemented many of the suggestions we received. The feedback we received has helped ensure we have a strong resolution to bring before you today.

The slogan on the PowerPoint slide at the start of the meeting this morning was "women leading change." We have an opportunity to be women leading change in the aging experience in Ontario by passing this resolution. I have talked with other seniors' clubs in the Owen Sound area about this idea of a seniors' advocate resolution. If we pass this resolution today, we will be the first group to move this idea forward. Let's be women leading change and adopt this resolution. Thank you.


WOMEN EXPLORING ISSUES (WEI)

MEMBERS' MUSINGS...

Owen Sound and the area is full of brave refugees who had to flee their country. Not because they wanted to, but because an aggressor country declared war. This happened to Olga Suhina, a wife and mother of three children. Until the Russian invasion of the Ukraine, Olga's family was living happily in a large apartment in the beautiful port city of Odessa. She had trained and done research as a hydrological engineer but, after the children arrived, she and her husband started an electrical parts import business with supply boats coming into the busy port. All this ended when the planes started bombing their city in February 2022.

Exactly one year later, I went to the local library having been asked to meet 'a refugee' who apparently needed help with her English. I saw a lovely young-looking woman standing alone by the reception desk. She looked like she couldn't possibly have straggled through Europe for months (penniless, with three kids!), waiting and

hoping for a country to let them in. But she had. Canada had finally given Olga a work visa and they had arrived at Pearson Airport in July 2022 knowing no one. A Russian family took them in for a few weeks - and soon the Ukrainian Foundation offered a year of housing in a strange (to them) place called Owen Sound. Up they came. The kids started school and Olga immediately began making and selling Ukrainian food at the Farmer's market, helped by her wonderful kids, and what she now calls her 'market family'.

Olga's oldest child, Alice/Alicia, will be off to university in a year's time. Not surprisingly, she is way more capable than the average 16-year-old. Olga and her kids still run the kitchen at the Saturday Farmer's market, but on May 30th this year, Olga opened her own cafe - fittingly called **Olga's Cafe** - at the Heritage Mall in the former food court. Members of the CFUW community do a lot to support women in this area. A small but meaningful addition to this list would be to support Olga, and people like her, by buying food or drink at the market or the new cafe.

These are people who live among us and who continue to demonstrate courage and enterprise beyond anything most of us could ever muster. My bet is that Olga and her three offspring will contribute more to Canada in the years ahead, than Canada ever gave to them.
