Highlights for the October 4th, 2022 Executive Meeting

The Executive held its October meeting once again at the Owen Sound and North Grey Union Public Library. Vice-President Cynthia Lemon assumed the role of chair in the absence of President Anne Seymour. On behalf of the president, Cynthia reported that the Club is still waiting for CFUW National to forward the balance owing on our Graduate Women International fee rebate. The delay may be the result of the recent changeover of the national organization's board of directors and the time needed for the new officers to get up to speed with outstanding issues. CFUW National is also in the process of surveying member clubs regarding a potential name change, so stay tuned for the results of that initiative.

As you'll see from the various reports in this newsletter, the Club is in a healthy financial situation given the stability of the membership and our members' generous support for our community projects. Based on the reports the Executive received from the various committees and coordinators, the Club is looking forward to a year of engaging programs and to the opportunity of increasing its community engagement and advocacy work.

An outcome of the Club's scholarship fund was a recent invitation to attend the opening of the Georgian College Owen Sound campus's new full four-year nursing program. Previously, nursing students would spend the first two years at the college and then move on to a university elsewhere in the province to complete their program. Vice-President Cynthia Lemon and former president Trisha Hendrie attended the event on behalf of the Club and were reportedly highly impressed by the state-of-the-art technology that is in place to support the program. The new program accepted 150 students. Ninety percent of the 900 applicants were from Grey, Bruce and Simcoe, which should bode well for local hiring once these students graduate. At a future meeting, the Executive will consider whether the Club will direct one of our scholarships to the nursing program.

From the Desk of the Archivist...

I've heard from many of you that you are enjoying this stroll through the history of the Club. Throughout our Club's 32 years we have enjoyed listening and learning, promoting education, discussing, sharing, advocating, connecting with others in the community, giving to our Scholarship Program and, just having fun together. How lucky we are to belong to such a dynamic group of women.

I'm starting this month reviewing the year 2006 – 2007. It seems like just yesterday!

Terri Hope became President in September 2006, Joan Bain was VP, Loreen Cumming, Secretary, Treasurer was Lynne Cox and Judy Thomson wrote the Newsletter. Brenda Bergen and Mim Cady headed the Program Committee. The Theme for the year was "What Can We Do About It?" Most of our meetings were held at St. Mary's Church Centre. As it was a Municipal Election year, we began with "Democracy in Action" with a panel of local candidates, Judy Gay, Shane Jolley and Ruth Lovell, incumbent Mayor for Owen Sound. The October meeting featured Peter Middleton who spoke about "Climate Change". In November, the topic was "Violence against Women" and this was a dinner meeting at Georgian College. A delightful Christmas evening program was held in December at the Butchart Estate Bed and Breakfast. At that meeting, our Regional Director presented our Club with an Achievement Award for having the highest Provincial increase in Membership... 55 Members! In January 2007 the topic was "Recruitment of Physicians to Grey Bruce". In February our guest speaker was Laura Robinson whose topic was "Generations of Hope – Creating a place where Native kids can fly". A donation of \$335 was given to Laura to assist with transportation in getting the kids to Cross Country Ski Competitions. In March, Ros Brooks spoke about "The State of Child Care in Ontario. "CFUW Resolutions" was the topic for April and the Annual General Meeting featured MaryAnne Alton.

All in all, it was a very productive and proactive year,

"...writing letters in support of issues relating to family law and to banning the cosmetic use of pesticides in our community. We connected with the First Nations kids on the Cape Croker reserve by assisting Laura Robinson in her work. We volunteered to sit on one of the doctor recruitment committees, learned more about how the courts handle women offenders, heard about the problematic state of child care in Ontario, met with local politicians, learned more about Climate Change. In each case we thought about what we could do and made some proactive choices." ~ Terri Hope, President

The Issues Group headed by Marg Cameron, was especially busy tackling topics such as Dangerous Toxins in Your Home; Packaging and Recycling; Mim Cady lead the discussion on Wind Power: Pros and Cons; and Judy Gay lead a discussion on Land Use and Regional Planning. The Outreach Committee, headed up by Donna Elliott, was working on bringing Maude Barlow, to Owen Sound in September 2007. We appreciate the incredible amount advocacy work that Terri Hope and her team did in 2006-2007.

In 2006, CFUW National made important changes to General eligibility criteria for membership. The new directive was to establish the "Associate Membership" in our Constitution. It meant that women without university degrees, but "who share common goals" may participate in CFUW activities. It was a positive move to extend membership to more women in our community.

NeighbourWoods North ...

On Saturday October 15th, Grey County (with NeighbourWoods North) is launching the first phase of the transformation of their large property at one of the entrances to the city of Owen Sound. The event will consist of a short ceremony followed by the planting of a few small trees and shrubs.

Grey County folks and other volunteers will join the NeighbourWoods North gang about 9:30 a.m. at the corner of 9th Avenue and 6th Street East - on the property of the Grey County Administration Building. Parking is behind the building at the east end of 6th Street.

Before the planting starts, there will be an opportunity to find the **free coffee and doughnuts** table - and meet others who are passionate about bringing everyone into the climate change resilience era - questioning the custom of mowing large mono-turf lawns which do not feed biodiversity or improve the land's capacity to adapt to climate change.

There will also be a few tables set up for general information from groups such as NeighbourWoods North, the Owen Sound Field Naturalists, the Grey County Master Gardeners - and the City of Owen Sound who will provide a planting demonstration.

The ceremony will begin with a few words of encouragement from Grey County, the City of Owen Sound and our Indigenous neighbours for the vision that drives this planting.

Volunteer planters should wear planting clothes and rubber boots - and bring gloves, a shovel, and an empty bucket, if you have one. Best to give your own tools some kind of identifying marker so they don't get lost in the general pile. Young people are especially welcome.

Grey County and NeighbourWoods North volunteers hope to see you at this fun, important and symbolic event. All are welcome.
