From the Desk of the Archivist...

For the past 30-plus years, our Club historians and archivists have collected Newsletters, Program Brochures, Annual Reports and files of Special Events. The Club's history has been well documented and shared with you before, particularly at our 10th and 20th Anniversaries. Our thanks go to Donna Phillips, Judy Thomson and Jan Middleton for keeping our history alive. It seems appropriate, in this monthly column, to share with you, especially newer members, some of the highlights of this treasure trove of information as we celebrate our 33rd year.

Here is a glimpse into what our Club members have accomplished, and the dedicated women who have helped us grow and evolve... 30+ years later. This month we focus on 2007 - 2008:

Happy New Year everyone! I am ever optimistic that each year will be even better than the last. Let's hope I'm right! I am back on track now and digging again into the Club archives for interesting historical tidbits that might interest you.

Joan Bain was President in 2007 – 2008. We had 53 members. The Scholarship Chair, Jan Middleton reported that "7 Scholarships were awarded during the fiscal year (September 2006 to August 2007, for a total of \$2,900. Three Scholarships of \$600 each were awarded before the close of the fiscal years on August 31, 2008.


It was a great year in many ways, but especially due to the hard work and effort put forth by the Outreach Committee. It takes a year to effectively produce a special community Outreach event, and in early 2007, Terri Hope formed a group to manage an Outreach event featuring Maude Barlow, recognized author and then Chair of the Council of Canadians. The successful event was held at the Bayshore Arena on September 20, 2007 with over 200 people in attendance. With tickets sold at \$30.00, "This event generated a profit of \$3,200 of which \$1,700 was given to the Scholarship Fund, and \$1,500 was held in general funds for the purpose of providing seed money for future Outreach events. Ms Barlow's topic was "Global Warming and the Impact on the Great Lakes".

In October 2007, under the leadership of Donna Elliott, our Club sponsored a special contest called "Three Wonders of Grey Bruce". The premise of the contest was to choose, through the process of nominations, a place, building, or artifact with unique significance to Grey Bruce.

In January, 2008 the judges chose the most nominated entries --

The Women's Institute Cairn at Kemble, the Lake Huron Sunsets, and the Bruce Trail. The runners up were The Stained Glass Windows, Christ Anglican Church in Meaford; the Tom Thomson Art Gallery and Wiarton Willy. Our CFUW and members of the community really enjoyed this contest and certainly one outcome was the raising of the

awareness and profile of our Club.

Dr. Taylor will outline plans for renovating and rebuilding the Golden Dawn Senior Citizen Home in Lion's Head: "We want to make a true home-like environment, and avoid the Ministry of Long-Term Care's prescription for an 'institution' layout. We want to expand our centre into a community hub, where passers-by will want to come in to visit our residents, and maybe use the store, pharmacy, or day care. We intend to set up our own not-for-profit home care base, to provide comprehensive home care for the folks in North Bruce Peninsula and allow them to be "re-abled" and age in place. Of course, we will have to convince the MOHLTC that this is the right thing to do..."

OSHaRE

Over the holidays, I had the privilege of volunteering at <u>OSHaRE</u>. There are many opportunities to share and participate in our local community and I know that many of you are very involved in local non-for-profits and different agencies. I started working at OSHaRE when we still served meals and were housed at the Harmony Centre. Prior to COVID, OSHaRE relocated to the former Salvation Army Thrift Store on 3rd Avenue East (next to Casero Kitchen Table). Then COVID hit and everything closed down in March 2020. Except OSHaRE. It stayed open, providing its service. It never closed; it just changed its format. It began to provide meals for those at <u>Safe N Sound</u>. Then it provided food support as far away as Markdale and Hanover. All with a staff of 3.5 and a few volunteers. The most remarkable thing to me as a volunteer was the sense of purpose and the resilience of the staff. But the biggest piece was the community response.

I give you this example to demonstrate what an amazing community we live in. Many of you have lived here for many years and are such an integral part of this place. You know the needs of this community and you have contributed for years in time and money to various groups.
