Highlights of the November Executive Meeting

The Executive met by Zoom on November 3rd and made a number of decisions aimed at assisting the organization to connect with and support its members and furthering its community work.

The Executive adopted a new social media policy designed to provide guidelines for the Club's Facebook page and website and other electronic communications. As a leader in this area, the Club will share the policy with other Ontario CFUW clubs that are also turning to social media to connect with their members. The Executive is moving forward with seeking proposals for the design of a Club logo. It has also decided to develop a recorded, visual version of its Acknowledgement of Territory for use at executive and general meetings. Past-President Janet Glasspool will provide the voice-over and the accompanying photograph is by local photographer Willy Waterton.

The Club continues to be an active participant in CFUW National. The national organization has been dealing with longstanding concerns regarding its international body, Graduate Women International (GWI). In particular, CFUW National has been responding to concerns within its membership regarding GWI's lack of transparency and accountability for its fiscal practices. President Ann Magner, on behalf of the executive team, will be contacting Club members to provide current and complete information on this issue, and seek members' support in taking action to ensure CFUW National's Mediation Working Group Report of June 14, 2020 is acted on, now.

In response to the many generous donations received by our club's scholarship fund in memory of Jean Milburn, an active Club member who passed away in August, the Executive has decided to dedicate one of its four student scholarships in the upcoming academic year in her name. The Owen Sound Little Theatre is also planning to dedicate a streaming next month of a performance of its 2018 production of *A Dramatic Reading of Charles Dickens' A Christmas Carol* to Jean who contributed to the production's success.

SCIENTIST IN SCHOOL (SiS)

It is with great pleasure that I announce that the CFUW will be hosting the Scientist in School virtual workshops at Alexandra Community School shortly! Workshops are now booked on November 11, two on the 18th, and one on December 1st.

Alexandra Community School will now have five virtual workshops booked this year, providing enrichment for children from SK to grade 6. Our original donation of \$1,000 will allow for four workshops. A further donation from the Nuclear Waste Management Organization has enriched the opportunities for these students this year! Indeed, the message of supporting youth with STEM is growing within Grey Bruce! This is excellent news! Our support and participation with the Scientist in School project has acted as a motivator to other organizations and I, personally, am proud of our leadership role. We continue to take an advocacy role within our community for women and youth issues.

Although the expense of the workshops is quite cost effective, additional costs have been incurred by the SiS organization to move to virtual platforms this year. This is due to the cost of the materials in the individual mini-kits, staff time in packing them, and the shipping fees. These personal mini-kits will make a wonderful impression and create excitement about science. Our Executive have committed to supporting this additional nominal fee of \$80.00 representing a cost increase from \$250.00 to \$270.00 per workshop. It has been hard to keep students engaged when they must remain seated with no shared classroom materials. In-classroom workshops are not viable this year under COVID restrictions.

As the Project Coordinator, I am of the opinion that the Club membership should be aware of an additional benefit that will be derived from our donation. At the beginning of each workshop, CFUW will be acknowledged as the donor. Thus, local teachers, principals, parents, and family members will be aware of our support and commitment to STEM.

You may also recall that my original project plan also included an evaluation stage (Annual Reports 2019 and 2020). These will be completed immediately following the workshop. Each teacher will be asked to complete a Post-Workshop Survey outlining both successes and areas of improvement. We will be provided with a summary report. I will continue to request this report, as soon as feasibly possible, to allow us to evaluate the on-going viability of our involvement.

We have kept our commitments to this project this year, facing several challenging issues head on. I am both appreciative and excited about this step forward.

Archives Policy

Archives preserve the history of the Club. Archived items have important historic, aesthetic, social, administrative value. Materials of value are items that may be suitable for, and in good enough condition for promotion, use or display during future historic and celebratory occasions held by the Club. These examples include letters, photographs, newsletters, special projects, brochures, programs of important events, photos, annual reports, Membership Lists, and Minutes of Meetings.

Archived material must be properly labelled and filed in a safe environment. The Archivist will ensure the collection, sorting and filing of documents, and that information is readily accessed and available when required by members of the Club.

SOCIAL MEDIA

It has been a busy month and we now have a Social Media Policy! We would like to thank Janet Glasspool for her great work on creating this new policy as our club moves forward using social media to engage our members. We are now one of the first clubs in Ontario to have a written policy. To view the policy, please visit our website: www.cfuwowensound.com.

The Social Media Policy governs members' use of our social media channels including the CFUW Owen Sound and area website and the public Facebook page. It also includes the use of the private Facebook group which will be accessible only by CFUW Owen Sound and area members when online.

Here is a short summary of some key expectations for our members' use:

- Confidentiality: avoid publishing confidential information.
- Personal Privacy: settings allowing others to post information or see information that is personal should be set to limit access.
- Transparency: members will use their own real names, be clear who they are and identify themselves as a member of CFUW, where appropriate
- Copyright Laws: respect laws governing copyright and always attribute any quotation to the original author or source.
- Respect: all messages will respect the CFUW organization, the audience and fellow members.
- Acknowledgement: if an error is made, the member should correct it quickly.

We've had over 75% of our members using zoom to date in some manner and welcome everyone to participate. There are some great conversations happening every Tuesday at coffee hour from 4-5 pm. If you are having problems getting on with zoom, please let me know and I can arrange some help.

The first Facebook Workshop held back on October 14, 2020 presented by Lynda Chiotti was well attended and even those who use Facebook learned something new. Lynda presented a basic overview of Facebook and discussed how to set up a Facebook account, privacy settings, etc. We will be hosting a follow up for Facebook users in the near future and will email out an invitation to all when we have a date set.

A Facebook private group is currently being set up and will be announced later in November. This will only be available to members and will offer a forum where information can flow more freely among members and not accessible to the general public. You will need to have a Facebook account to join this group.

Grey Roots Virtual Fall Lecture Series - Memory and Commemoration in Early Medieval Britain – Tuesday, November 10 at 1 p.m. – online @: [Grey Roots virtual fall lecture series](#)

Join Dr. Alison Leonard from the safety and comfort of your own home. The act of commemorating is a practice shared by humans across time and space. Shared, but incredibly diverse. Between the banning of paganism by Roman rulers in AD 392, and the arrival of "heathen" Viking invaders in AD 793, the peoples of early medieval Britain displayed an astounding array of commemorative practices. Some, like the Sutton Hoo burials, were monumental. Others were strictly in keeping with contemporary Christian doctrine. And in between, we find quirky, questionable, ostentatious, and endearing acts, each of which showcases a unique set of beliefs.

In this talk we will look at the wide range of commemorative practices to be found throughout early medieval England, Wales, and Scotland. We will explore how memory was maintained and passed on, and the role of remembering in early medieval society. Throughout, we will see how the evolution of commemorative practices links into the wider history of Britain, between the fall of Rome and the first Viking invasions.


Dr. Alison Leonard gained her PhD in Archaeology at the University of York, UK, specializing in Early Medieval and Viking Age archaeology. After working as a researcher and lecturer at the University of Cambridge, Alison has returned to her hometown of Owen Sound where she continues to research and write about archaeology.

**THE STATE OF ONTARIO'S LONG TERM CARE IN A COVID PANDEMIC
WHAT NEEDS TO CHANGE**



Natalie Mehra has been the **Executive Director of the Ontario Health Coalition** for 20 years. She has built the Health Coalition into the largest public interest group on health care in the province. She is a past Board Member of the Canadian Health Coalition where she spearheaded numerous national campaigns to safeguard and improve single-tier public Medicare.
